**February 17**

**Biodiversity Museum Day**

**12pm to 4pm**

**April 7**

**Spring open house**

**11am to 2pm**

**April 14**

**Planting the Bee Garden**

**8am to 11am**

Bee pollination brings us much of our food and supports most of our wildland plants. Interest in helping bee pollinators has never been greater, but what can you do in your own garden to make sure it is bee-friendly? We'll discuss garden design and plant selection based on bee biology as well as how to encourage insect natural enemies to keep bee gardens pesticide-free. We'll also learn about some of the latest research on bees and gardens and how to incorporate this into your garden. Content is suitable for ages 16 and up.

The class will conclude with a tour of the Haven for a hands-on look at plants and bees. Registration (\$40, free parking) includes light breakfast and snacks, course handouts, a solitary bee house, and a plant for your garden. **Bee Watching for Beginners**

**12pm to 3pm**

Observing and identifying the bees in our gardens can be challenging. We'll start with an overview of bee anatomy and learn how to distinguish bees from other insects. We'll then look at key features of common bees that can be used to identify them in flight.
